A Message from David Watson, Musical Director, Phoenix Brass

We are into May already and the weeks seem to fly pass, maybe it is because we all have a lot to do, just like the band. As a rule the first four months of the year is spent getting music ready for the summer season but this year we have had to prepare for two major concerts and a half a concert.

The first concert was held in Marlborough Town Hall with the very accomplished Cromwell Singers and, in front of a full house, both band and choir played their part in producing a super concert.

There were rehearsals during the afternoon and Betty Walley and her helpers produced a wonderful tea for around 95 people both singers and players were very thankful.

The other concert was held in St Lawrence Church, Hungerford where the band played a varied programme of music which included two solos by Claire Knowles who played "I Don't Know How To Love Him" and by Steve Rogers who performed "The Wind Beneath My Wings". The whole programme was well received by the audience with many kind remarks passed onto the players. We were all treated to cream teas during the interval thanks to Chris Buck and her helpers.

The half concert was given in Froxfield Village Hall at the Friends AGM. The AGM used to be held on a Thursday evening just before band rehearsal but was only attended by band players and the Friends of Phoenix Committee. Some may say it was a waste of time but I think it was successful since fifteen people attended the meeting. It was also agreed to increase the membership fee to £5 per year.

The training band needed a single Bflat Bass at a cost of £1100. Marilyn Mason applied for a grant of £500 towards the cost which was successful and the remaining cost was met by the band fund and Friends of Phoenix funds. The bass was presented to Jamie Greenwood at a concert given by the Training Band in Froxfield Village Hall which I am pleased to say attracted a full house. So, both the main band and training band have already had a busy time.

It is a shame that the Lambourn Spring Working has been cancelled because of soft ground. We always look to that engagement as the start of our summer season, a nice day out and a good "blow".

Next up is the Band Dinner. This is a special event this year since the band celebrates its Silver Anniversary and I am hopeful that Mike Kilroy, the Band President, will be there.

I would like to thank you all for your support. It really does mean a lot to the band members.

- Enjoyment - playing music in a group is amazingly enjoyable and thoroughly rewarding
- Teamwork - by learning to play in a group you learn to work together to make music
- Concentration - playing music requires concentration, and learning to play in a group helps to develop concentration
- Confidence - you cannot hide if you are a brass player or percussionist, and playing in a friendly group is a great way of making friends and building confidence
- Tradition - The British Brass Band is a tradition dating back centuries, and groups like this help to continue that tradition
- Numeracy and logic - learning music is proven to assist in developing mathematical skills and logic skills
- Easy - it is surprisingly easy to make a sound from a brass instrument, and players can quickly grasp enough basic ability to play in a group

Together for Springtime' – Phoenix Brass and The Cromwell Singers

“Saturday’s concert featuring Phoenix Brass and the Cromwell Singers was a splendid occasion. We were welcomed by David Watson, Musical Director of Phoenix Brass, who throughout the evening set a relaxed and informal atmosphere.

The band started the programme in high spirits with a vivacious and up-beat rendition of the popular march ‘Light of Foot’ by Carl Latann.

Accompanied by the band, soloist Adam Bayliss treated us to a most accomplished performance of the ‘Adagio’ from Rodrigo’s ‘Concierto de Aranjuez’, originally written for guitar. Conjuring a lovely warm tone from his flugelhorn, Adam Bayliss delighted the audience with his lyrical and expressive playing.

Conducted by their Musical Director, Sarah Cope, the choir performed three movements from ‘The Armed Man: A Mass For Peace’ by Karl Jenkins.

In the ‘Sanctus’ I was impressed by the choir’s crisp articulation, rhythmic precision and effective use of dynamics. The soprano voices soared beautifully in the ‘Hosannas’. A passionate rendition of the ‘Hymn Before Action’, full of foreboding, was powerful and dramatic.

In a captivating ‘Benedictus’, the choir contrasted the serene and exultant passages to great effect. They are very fortunate in their accompanist Daphne George who showed considerable expertise at the piano.

Both the choir and band brought a glorious range of colour to their lively, cheerful and enthusiastic performance of Borodin’s ‘Polovtsian Dances’. The choruses praising Khan Konchak, brimming with energy, were very exciting. The final chorus, with the choir singing their hearts out, was exhilarating.

The choir gave a superb rendition of ‘As Long As I Have Music’. Clearly music is very important to them. Throughout the concert I was impressed by the number of singers who kept in regular eye-contact with the conductor.

The band’s animated portrayal of the popular theme from the film ‘A Bridge Too Far’ was exciting, dramatic and full of life. Their rousing and high-spirited performance of ‘And All That Jazz’, from the musical ‘Chicago’, was magnificent.

We had all enjoyed a wonderful evening – congratulations to the Cromwell Singers and Phoenix Brass”.

Phoenix Brass In Concert at St Lawrence Church, Hungerford

The Band was invited by Chris Buck to perform a Concert at St Lawrence Church, Hungerford on 29 April 2018 to help raise funds towards the Church Fabric Fund. The discovery of leaks attributed to rotten woodwork had resulted in the commencement of urgent repairs to the Church lead work. Fund raising efforts during 2017, including grants and the receipt of individual donations, has realised almost the full amount. However, the need to add a contingency of £19,500 to cover the replacement of the original lead and additional costs had increased the original figure to circa £32,000.

An audience of circa 70 people attended the Concert and complemented the band's smart uniform, appearance and playing. They thoroughly enjoyed the mixed repertoire of music and the individual solos by Claire Knowles and Steve Rogers who performed a flugelhorn solo, "I Don't Know How To Love Him" and a trombone solo "The Wind Beneath My Wings" respectively, which received rapturous applause.

As well as thanking David and the players, thanks must be extended to Chris Buck and her team who provided cream teas and a raffle.

Thank you to everyone who turned out on a rather cold afternoon to support the Band.
